

CENTENNIAL ROCK SWAP

Mr. G. Arthur Brown, Jr., Curator of Minerals, Cranbrook Institute of Science, Bloomfield Hills, Michigan, will be the guest speaker on Saturday evening, August 26th, at the Centennial Rock Swap planned by five local mineral clubs of Toronto and vicinity for August 26 and 27, 1967, at the Cold Creek Conservation Area.

Events planned are as follows:

Friday Evening: Films will be shown for those arriving early.

Saturday: The official opening at 9.30 and the immediate departure for a field trip of those wishing to go. In the afternoon will be an auction of samples donated by various clubs and individuals. At 8.00 p.m. Mr. Brown will give an illustrated talk on collecting Aquamarine in Colorado. The evening will be completed with a camp-fire.

Sunday: The day will again begin with a field trip at 9.30 a.m., followed by another auction at 2.00 p.m.

Throughout the week-end, along with the planned activities, will be the constantly active swap tables and displays of minerals and gems.

While there is no charge for the event itself, a nominal parking fee of \$1.00 per vehicle per day is charged by the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority. An invitation is extended to any and every individual in Canada or the U.S.A. who is interested in the earth sciences, fossils, collecting rocks, micromounting and lapidary work. Rockhounds will be able to camp for \$1.00 per campsite for the week-end.

Cold Creek Conservation Area is located near Nobleton, Ontario, Canada, approximately 1/2 hour's drive north on Highway #27 from the junction of Highways #401 and #27, north-west of Toronto. See map on reverse side.
